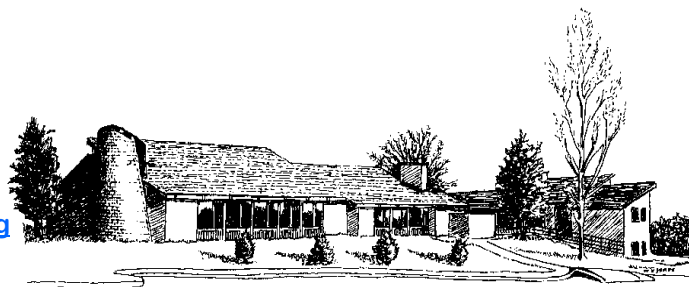

Marc My Words

Many good reasons led to publishing a once-a-month newsletter, but the article submission deadline challenges the writer. This month is especially tough, because though I write on Saturday, December 15, with Christmas and the recent shootings in Colorado Springs very much in the present, both will be “old news” by the time this reaches you. That fact led me to ponder how quickly and often that oxymoron, “old news,” appears in our lives.

The world is speeding up; events which grab our attention don't hold on for long, being superseded by new events, “news,” in turn soon to become old. The problem is that if we wish to linger with events, asking that attention be paid, we run the risk of appearing behind the times, out of date, late. Sins come and go; we can live together today and no one (very few) will raise an eyebrow. However, don't dare to be stuck in the past, or the furies will pursue us!

On December 15, 2007, reports in the news indicate that many Americans are tired of thinking about Iraq, are tired of the endless debates about gun control, and tend to view Darfur as...brace yourselves...old news. How we can ever focus on problem solving and the confrontation with serious moral issues in light of our new consciousness is a question blowing in the wind.

Perhaps the only successful way to address this dilemma is to convert “news” to drama. Make a movie about it, sing a song about it, write a play about it, —maybe then we'll pay attention. Perhaps this is nothing new. Years ago, encountering a society willing to overlook grinding poverty, industrial pollution, and urban violence, Charles Dickens converted news into novels and short stories, capturing the attention of a public suffering from a 19th century version of compassion fatigue and blatant indifference. Abstraction is hard to hold in our hearts; suffering people who are brought to life, even in fiction, grab our attention and don't let go. In 2008 I covenant to work with you in doing whatever it takes to unbury the martyred dead from the tomb of old news, bringing them into our present, into our consciousness, into our conscience.

Can you believe it is a new year already? Where does the time go? If this question ever haunts you, then our class series which begins in January and meets once a month for four months entitled **Slow Down and Remodel Your Life** might be just the gathering for you.

I know – if you really wanted to slow down why would you take another class? I understand this thinking completely, and yet I still think there is value in giving time to this series. Drawing from the books **In Praise of Slowness: How a Worldwide Movement Is Challenging the Cult of Speed** by Carl Honore, **The Not So Big Life**, by architect/author Sarah Susanka, and **Sabbath: Finding Rest, Renewal and Delight in our Busy Lives** by Wayne Muller, this series will not only be informative about emerging attitudes towards our current love affair with doing as much as we possibly can while suffering from the accompanying stress, but will allow us a time to slow down together. The Slow Movement has been thriving for years in Europe, where Slow Cities encourage walking and more interaction with people. Slow Food, which advocates both local and healthy ingredients as well as enjoying meals together, has been a force since the 1980s. In the United States, the Slow Movement is small but growing. The latest effort from architect/author Sarah Susanka, known to many for her “Not So Big House” books, is *The Not So Big Life*, which shows it is possible to take our finger off the fast-forward button. Using the language and metaphors of the architectural world, Susanka illustrates that the joy of leading a not so big life is discovering that much of what we love has been there the entire time, just waiting to be revealed.

And finally, Wayne Muller’s book will help us rediscover the importance of creating a Sabbath time of rest and rejuvenation. Join us for this series which will be held once a month for four months—no point in rushing a class on slowing down, is there? We will share a meal, participate in some exercises, engage in goal setting and personal reflection, view a talk Sarah gave in Fort Collins earlier this year, and take part in a Tai Chi class. We will also enjoy each other’s company and hopefully slow down and remodel our lives - at least a bit!

Classes will be held on the last Sunday of each month: January 27, February 24, March 30 and April 27. We will begin with a potluck dinner at 6 pm; the evening will conclude by 9 pm. \$30 donation requested for the series and the book *In Praise of Slowness*.

RELEASING YOUR CREATIVE SPIRIT

Suffice it to say that those who read this work won’t soon forget it, whether they like it or not.

In the first session of this two-part class we will discuss the short novella, and the following week we will view the John Houston adaptation of *Wise Blood*. Houston’s film, which is very hard to find, is considered by many to be his most daring.
